18thNational Caravan Rally Report. Sandgropers Caravan Club



The representatives for the Sandgropers Caravan Club, Ian and Beth Moore and Glenda Olesen left Perth on Sunday 26^{thFeb}, meeting at the Lakes and travelling to a free camp at Southern Cross. They then travelled to Ceduna over the next four days with free camps at Southern Hills campsite, Drystone Wall, Bunda Cliffs and a paid site at Madura Pass in-between.

They enjoyed eleven days on the Eyre Peninsula, staying in Streaky Bay, Coffin Bay, Port Lincoln and Cowell. Then on to Port Augusta and the Flinders Ranges, staying at Rawnsley Station and enjoying a flight over the Wilpena Pound. Then on to Peterborough, Burra and Cobdogla before the National Rally at Barmera on Monday 26th March.

The weather for the arrival and set up was quite damp but the local clubs had marshals at every corner and street captains to guide you into place. They later acknowledged that their system had been developed from the excellent effort from the 2019 Albany Rally. The National Rally was opened on Monday evening by Chairman John Anderson and State and local politicians and Mayors of the district, this was accompanied with local cheeses and wines and entertainment. The major sponsor for the rally was Adelaide RV Over the next eight days the time was filled with ladder golf, disc bowls, photography, quilting and sewing, guest speakers on caravans and travelling, caravan safety and street breakfasts and happy hours. Various tours had been arranged.

Ian and Beth did a Murray River cruise on a 100 year old paddle steamer and another full day winery tour and visit to Maggie Beer's kitchen shop and stops at scenic points overlooking the Barossa valley. They and Glenda also did self- drives through the Riverland and found numerous Silo Art sites.

WA was represented by the highest number of clubs at 18 and 53 vans with some only one or two vans [Red Gum, Sandgropers]. Some of larger groups, Australian Happy Wanderers [9 vans] and Freedom Caravanners [6 vans.] The Australian Touring RV club had 6 vans and were on their way to Tamworth for their clubs national rally.

The entertainment each night was good and varied but the evenings were cool and hard for the acts to keep many people through to the end.

The rally ended on the Tuesday evening with a happy hour, closing speeches and handover to NSW clubs for the 19^{th} National Rally to be held in Mudgee in 2025. The 2028 20^{th} National Rally is in Victoria in Bendigo.



Following this a hot tasty dinner was served, table row by table row at four buffet stations for over 700 people whist being entertained by a fellow traveller, singer and raconteur who is roaming round Australia doing shows and collecting funds for charity.

Being a milder night there was singing and dancing till late. Wednesday was sunny and vans were leaving in an orderly manner from 7am through to late morning.
