This Park has recently been upgraded with all facilities being renewed. Powered sites are \$16 per night - as this is a Shire Park, payable to the Treasurer in cash.

Driving Instructions:

From Williams turn right into Williams-Pinjarra Rd, left into Williams-Darkan Rd. At the junction with Coalfields Hwy turn right - The caravan park is 700 metres down the road, left hand side.

From Collie drive straight through along the Coalfields Hwy to Darkan. The caravan park is 700 metres on the right prior to the junction with Williams-Darkan Rd.

The caravan park has been renovated with great facilities. There are 10 powered sites with double concrete pads, 10 on grass. A dump point has been added.

The camp kitchen has microwave, gas hotplates and a large fridge. Outside the kitchen is a covered verandah with a large gas bbq. The area is enclose on two sides - Ian will take his large tarp and block off the other side to break the wind. Just outside this area is a metal fire pit with plenty of wood.

Darkan itself is a small town with few shops. There is an EziWay food store, hotel, small cafe/bookshop, Gull roadhouse and sports complex.

home.




Our first free camp, day 4 west of Balladonia, cold and wet, day 5 81 mile,peg after a very wet
