34 Portland Drive BINNINGUP

Binningup is a coastal village with a scenic golf course at Lakewood Shores. A main beach is protected by a reef running parallel to it. The town contains a store, caravan park, skateboard park, recreation centre, youth camp, a public library and a public oval.

A <u>desalination plant</u> in Binningup provides Perth and surrounding areas including Mandurah, Kalgoorlie and Bunbury with drinking water

March 2nd - 7th Manjimup Caravan Park 300 km Long Weekend

Manjimup was named the <u>Noongar Aboriginal</u> words "Manjin" (a broad-leafed edible <u>reed</u>) and "up" (meeting place, or place of). Manjimup was first settled by timber cutter Thomas Muir, who took up land near the present town site in 1856. It was declared a town in 1910, and a railway from Perth was completed in 1911. Timber is the town's major industry, but it has been joined by fruit and vegetable farms, dairy farms, <u>wool</u>, <u>grain</u> and <u>vineyards</u>. The <u>Cripps Pink</u>, otherwise better known as the <u>Pink Lady apple</u> was created in Manjimup in 1973 by <u>John Cripps</u> of the then-named Western Australian <u>Department of Agriculture</u> and the trademark is now used on products across four continents. Manjimup used to produce frozen <u>French fries</u>, and had a lucrative <u>tobacco</u> industry that ended in the 1960s.
