UPCOMING RALLIES

MAY 31st - 3rd JUNE DOWERIN - Show ground 166Km

In 1906 the government extended the railway from <u>Goomalling</u> to the developing Dowerin Agricultural Area and decided to develop a townsite at the terminus. The <u>Aboriginal</u> name of the site chosen was "Wuguni", but "Dowerin", also an Aboriginal name, was already in local use for the place, and was the name gazetted in 1907. The name is derived from nearby Lake Dowerin, first recorded on maps around 1879. One source suggests dowerin is the Aboriginal word for the <u>twenty-eight parrot</u> (dow-arn), and another suggests it means "place of the throwing stick" (dower)

.In 1932 the Wheat Pool of Western Australia announced that the town would have two grain elevators each fitted with an engine, installed at the railway siding.[3]

5th JULY – 8th JULY WONGAN HILLS - 182Km

The town is named for a nearby range of hills that are found to the north-west of the town, also named Wongan Hills, which was first recorded in 1836. In 1925 an agricultural research station was established about 5 km north of the town which assisted in the diversification and improvements in farm practices through the state. The area is a prosperous agricultural region with activities focused on sheep, grain and pig-farming. [5]

Construction of a <u>grain silo</u> commenced in 1933 as part of the bulk handling scheme that had been introduced by the government and managed by <u>Cooperative Bulk Handling</u>.

In the early 1900s, poet <u>Lilian Wooster Greaves</u> lived with her family at Wongan Hills. Her book of poetry includes a number of prose and poetry items relating to living there at the time of the first world war.¹
