COMING RALLIES

MARCH 1st - 3rd GINGIN 93 KM Cabins available

Gingin's economy is mostly based on agriculture, although there has been an increasing focus on science with the establishment of the <u>Australian International Gravitational Observatory</u> and <u>Gravity Discovery Centre</u>. There is also a small military airfield, <u>RAAF Gingin</u>, located nearby.

MARCH 28-31st WAGIN 276km Camp at showgrounds

Wagin is a town and <u>shire</u> in the <u>Great Southern region</u> of <u>Western Australia</u>, approximately 225 km southeast of <u>Perth</u> on the <u>Great Southern Highway</u> between <u>Narrogin</u> and <u>Katanning</u>. It is also on <u>State Route 107</u>. The main industries are <u>wheat</u> and <u>sheep</u> farming.

The town itself came into existence after the construction of the <u>Great Southern Railway</u> which was completed in 1889 with the town originally called *Wagin Lake*. The name of the town is derived from <u>Wagin Lake</u>, a usually dry salt lake south of the town. The <u>Aboriginal</u> name is Waitjen, having been first recorded for the lake by a surveyor in 1869-72. There is uncertainty about the actual meaning of 'Wagin' but it is likely that it either means 'the place where emus watered' or 'Emu's watering hole'

MAY 3rd-6th Yarloop 126 km Camping on oval

Yarloop is a town in the <u>South West</u> of <u>Western Australia</u> along the <u>South Western Highway</u>, between <u>Waroona</u> and <u>Harvey</u>. At the <u>2006 census</u>, Yarloop had a population of 545.^[1] On 7 January 2016 a bushfire destroyed most of the town The name Yarloop is said to have originated from the words "yard loop", the rail loop into the timber yard there. However, the name is more likely <u>Aboriginal</u> in origin (most likely from the local <u>Bindjareb Noongar</u> people). Yalup Brook is situated only about 5 km north of Yarloop and there is similarity in pronunciation of the word and the early spelling variations of the siding (Yailoup and Yarloup) support it being Aboriginal
