
June and Allan Foote left from the Pumphreys rally to travel east and we wish them safe travels.

# Big Valley Farm - Margaret River - 275 km

**Big Valley** Campsite is nestled amongst the hills of our family owned working sheep **farm**, ten minutes South East of **Margaret River**. #### Jennacubbine - 117 Km

The town's name derives from the <u>Noongar</u> name for a well in the area, which may mean "salt water" according to some sources and was first recorded by explorer <u>Augustus Gregory</u> in 1848 as "Jenacubine", with the current spelling being adopted in 1889. Jennacubbine was established as a siding on the railway line from <u>Northam</u> to <u>Goomalling</u> in June 1902.<sup>[2]</sup>
