
The next two rallies will be at Dowerin and Wongan Hills, so please put your name down for those if you haven't already.

UPCOMING RALLIES

5th JULY – 8th JULY WONGAN HILLS - 182Km

The town is named for a nearby range of hills that are found to the north-west of the town, also named <u>Wongan Hills</u>, which was first recorded in 1836. In 1925 an agricultural research station was established about 5 km north of the town which assisted in the <u>diversification</u> and improvements in farm practices through the state. The area is a prosperous agricultural region with activities focused on sheep, grain and pig-farming.^[5]

Construction of a <u>grain silo</u> commenced in 1933 as part of the bulk handling scheme that had been introduced by the government and managed by <u>Cooperative Bulk Handling</u>. [6]

In the early 1900s, poet <u>Lilian Wooster Greaves</u> lived with her family at Wongan Hills. Her book of poetry includes a number of prose and poetry items relating to living there at the time of the first world war.¹


