BINDOON SPRING FESTIVAL






school to see them perform while the rest of us sat around talking until they arrived back with the kids. We discovered the old Silver Chain building was open so moved in there as it was cold outside.

Back to Nature Caravan Park was opened in July 2011. The Park is situated on Cowalla Road in West Gingin, just over an hours drive from the metro area and within a 30 minute drive from the towns of Gingin, Lancelin, Guilderton, Seabird and Ledge Point.

The Park is in 200 acres of scenic undulating native bushland, which has full registration under the Land For Wildlife scheme. This makes it an idea location for enjoying the wildflowers in spring, bushwalking, birdwatching or simply for a quiet getaway.

CHRISTMAS RALLY

Cervantes is a town off Indian Ocean Drive about 198 kilometres north-north-west of, <u>Perth</u> in the <u>Shire</u> of <u>Dandaragan</u> <u>I</u> The town was named after a ship that was wrecked nearby. The ship, in turn, was named after <u>Miguel de Cervantes</u>, author of <u>Don Quixote</u>.
