She is in Grade 6 last year of primary school and off Merriden High school next year. 26 students attend the Trayning primary school and it has no high school. The doctor was well known throughout the region and practiced there for some 50 years. He passed on a couple years back. These small towns now mostly have MPS places (Multi Purpose Services). This means







that in the 1980s a lot of the smaller hospitals were converted to have a 24 hour emergency facility and most now have a facility in the hospital for the aged people of the town. This in some cases include a dementia wing as well. The town itself seems to have a few

people living there. One gentleman stopped Bob and asked him what was going as he had these cars driving around. Casing the place he thought. Lots to steal here he said. Bob wasn't that sure. So to be sure we were spotted. Lunch was held at the old Kunno oval and after that some went rock seeing David and Paula went to see Mangowine homestead. David also went to Bencubbin where the dune buggy racing was. He tells Jim the place was crowded.

Back at camp fire building and soup was the order of the afternoon. Thanks to the ladies for adding vegies to the soup making and for helping with the preparation. So we still need a Treasurer. If anyone would like to nominate please do so by contacting David or myself.


THE CLUB CANNOT FUNCTION WITHOUT A TREASURER!!!

Located 163 km east of Perth and 249 m above sea level, Quairading is a very typical wheatbelt town with the mandatory wheat silos, railway siding, large old hotel and small number of shops servicing the surrounding farmers.
