For days before we all arrived at Margaret River, Perth and the south west copped a ferocious drenching and more rain was forecast for our stay. Still, we were all in good spirits and ready to face whatever the elements but there was plenty of talk about maybe heading to the North West in future to enjoy for the winter warmth!

At 5pm on Thursday we all gathered in the huge undercover area (which used to be part of an old wood sawmill) at the Margaret River Nature Park for a few drinks for Happy Hour. Tea that night was a jaffle iron cook up and we were fortunate to commandeer one of the large fire pits where we could all sit around the fire and cook our jaffles over the hot coals.
