

MEMBERS TRAVEL'S

Glenda gave a talk about her Japan holiday 'TEXTILE TOUR OF JAPAN ' on the Friday morning.

I have just returned from a marvelous 17 day tour with a group of quilters from South Australia.

Japan in mid winter is a very different experience. Each day was minuses temperatures with deep snow, a colour palette of grey, black and white with dashes of red persimmons and berries .

A Japan rail pass is worth gold as we travelled around the country on the very smooth, quiet, warm fast SKINKANSENS (the bullet express train). Zooming through the countryside of snow covered rice paddies, villages and modern cities. Even suburban trains have warm seats. The trains are "quiet time". No mobile phones allowed to ring or answered, texting only and quiet talking.

Our tour was to learn about tradional textiles so we met world renown artists in their homes, saw the indigo dyes being prepared, with SASHIKO stitch which was used by the peasant to create warm clothing and bedding as a decorative finish.

Silks, so important to Japan and KIMONAS are dyed and painted in many ways. In the old days the dyes would be washed out in cold mountains streams.

We were lucky enough to see the Golden Temple completely covered in gold leaf inside and out, in deep snow. A sight on the wish list of all Japanese. Beautiful temples of both Buddha and Shinko were visited. All have exciting markets nearby. The South Australians really boosted the Japanese economy.

Trips up to the high mountains to see wonderful old villages that had been important to the silk industry in the past were a treat. Covered in snow they were picture postcard perfect. Mt Fuji showed "herself" on a clear blue day with sunshine on the snow, as we went to see a fascinating museum of incredible kimonos, each one taking a year to complete.

The Internation+al quilt show in Tokyo, a city of 40 million completed our tour. More shops, fabulous quilts, with thousands of Japanese women we admired the beauty on display.

Japan drives on the left as we do. Great roads, no horns, screech of brakes or road rage. Such a calm quiet polite society. No noise, rubbish or graffiti. Great food, easy to get around. The entire trip a great experience.
