Next to Nitmiluk Ieliyn Nat Park, Edith Falls, north of Katherine? Wonderful swimming areas and great walks up to higher falls.

Although unpowered it is a lovely place to stay.

Noodling down the Mataranka and Bitter Springs hot springs good fun. Improvement at Mataranka good but Kel not thrilled with the croc nearby.

We headed east towards The Gulf of Carpentaria where we free camped at Goanna Creek rest area. A small delightful look out over the plains to Limmen Nat Park. A camp fire, with millions of stars made for a beautiful evening. Past Cape Crawford, a green clean roadhouse but we



continued towards Borroloola. Stopping at Caranbirini Conservation Reserve to view the lagoon full of water lillies and bird life. We passed the McArthur River mine. A mighty mine extracting lead and zinc. Using the good mine road we had a quick look at Borroloola then onto King Ash Bay via a dust bowl road.

The camp, King Ash Bay Fishing Club, with improvements, good facilities, was a lovely surprise. Roast pork, lemon meringue pie and fun at the club washed the dust away. Unfortunately the wind came up so no fishing available. A big disappointment to the men.

Returning to Caranbirini we walked through the sandstone pillars called the Organ Pipes, part of the lost city formations. Really worthwhile looking at. On return to our van Maureen & Ronnie had whipped up fresh scones, yum!

Turning left we headed down the Tablelands Highway. A single lane asphalt road, rough in places. Lots of cattle, the countryside looking good. It is such wide open landscape across the tablelands, Open Sky Country. We spent the night on Brunett Downs rest area. Once again a camp fire under a million stars. The police arrived, looking for a handcuffed escapee in a stolen car... Continuing southwards we passed a large family group of Wedge tailed eagles feeding on roadkill so we were able to closely see these magnificent birds. More cattle, lots of calves.



At Barkley Homestead we turned left onto the Barkly Highway into Queensland and crossed the empty wide open plains to camp beside the billabongs under the Coolibar trees at Camooweal. We were delighted to see Brolgas as well as pelicans, darters, herons etc all feeding in the billabong. Helen was fortunate to see the Brolgas dancing. A trip to the Drovers Camp where Tom Green kept us enthralled with tales of the drovers life and how

the stock routes were opened up.

A large flock of Straw Neck Ibis arrived then a huge feral ginger cat killed a Darter across from us. Brian B wanted a gun!

Mt Isa full up. A major rodeo attracting caravaners from all over. We met up with Lyn and Alan Kirby for lunch. Lovely to catch up with them again. Rains south of us forced us to reconsider going to Birdsville. Fear of being stuck out there a factor so we headed to Cloncurry and pretty country.



Turning onto the Lansborough Highway in Central West Queensland we headed to Winton. It is such flat empty grasslands, all a bright green due to recent rains. At the stockyards we were able to wash our vans and cars off the red dust and mud from our North. Winton has Gregorory North, a bush poet, The Man of Many Hats, in the caravan park so we had a very entertaining evening. The Australian Age of Dinosaurs, where fossil dinosaur bones are cleaned and restored is very interesting. Volunteers painstakingly clean away the millions of years of dirt.

We left Alice and continued northwards with Ron being sure there were no down hills. We stopped at ¹the Barrow Creek where just north the day previous there had been a tragic car and van accident. We stopped at the Marbles overnight and admired the formation of the rocks in the area. Up early and a warmer morning with a beautiful orange sunrise. Many ant hills through here have been dressed in T Shirts. Some of the Stuart Highway still have open speed limits. Lots of little

birds around here all quiet. We saw 3 cyclists on the highway and then two guys pushing carts along the highway, our way is faster and more comfortable. Cross the border into Queensland, the sign shows the lovely Gold Coast but nothing of the outback. Found a lovely spot on the Georgina at the Billabong in Cammoweal where we settled down to enjoy a couple of days. Pelicans Brolgas, little birds, a couple of bustards. My grandson was amazed to hear of the Lillies that close up in the evening. Loved seeing the Drovers Camp again and soak up our Australian History. Again we are off and camp east of Mount Isa. Heard some blasts at about 3am which Jim tells me are from the Mount Isa mines. Most nights we have been able to have fires as wood has been available. We didn't stop at Mount Isa and our next major stop was Longreach. We met a kiwi lass who was travelling to the Tanami Desert to work at a roadhouse just on the edge of the bitumen. Longreach and we went through the Qantas museum, again a great history lesson. Too wet on the Thompson river so off to parts unknown. Our next few days saw us travel through Cloncurry, Winton, Stongehenge, Windorah a tiny town in what seems the middle of nowhere. At this stage I was reading the book Tom Kruse the Birdsville Mailman and what a man he was. The roads are still narrow and rough, and watch for the cattle and roos. We find the two ways are great assets to warn each other of the cattle etc. We stopped at Cunnamulla where we learnt the story of the Artesian Basin. Looked for the Census forms as tonight is the BIG night where Australia finds out who is who and where they are. Well the Post Office has nothing but Jamie in the Tourist Bureau is most helpful however he has no forms. I ring the Census Office and get told they will find us tonight in the designated sites. If not she will remove our house from the list so we don't get a fine!!!!! Ok so how many grey nomads got missed. And no one turned up at the designated site as said.

With Jim leading we are heading for St George when eagle eyed Ron spots the sign and asks Jim are we going to Bourke. Nope quick turn around and we are right again.

Last trip we found a little pub called Nindigully, one of the odd little pubs in the outback. So lets go back where we met some outback Queenslanders, and what a great little spot. From there we head for Lightning Ridge, Ron rings Doris to see where she is. Well said Doris in Lightning Ridge, where said Ron, in the Opal Caravan Park, what number said Ron 19 said Doris, we are too in the Opal Park numbers 69 and 70. What a lovely catch up then Peter and Mary arrived so It's catch up all round. Mel and Suzie are here and as usual they give a great

show. We went to the Black Hand Mine where Ron Caplin has spent 19 years carving the limestone into all sorts of figures, animals, people, politicians, etc.




After Lightning Ridge we head uphill towards Glen Innes, a very Scottish town some 1100 mtres above sea level. Very proud of their history and some great buildings in town. Now in Glen Innes again we had to find room for two vans, the tourist places don't think we tow vans. Jim thinks carefully and leaves room for Ron. However he did encroach a little on the driveway in front. Its OK he said as he watched the Local Policeman manage to get past and into the back yard of the Police Station. Onto the hills again1410 mtres said the sign at Loch Lomond. Inverell is next the home of Thunderbolt the Bushranger. Bit of rain at this stage. Next morning we head to Tamworth again steep inclines and steep descents.

The weather is till rainy so we settle in and go to the museums of the country singers. We then took a drive to Werriss Creek which was one of the busiest train station in Aust. Many WW2 soldiers travelled through there for jungle war training. The koalas in this area have lost a lot of their numbers due to drought conditions.



We went to Silverton for a day, the Palace hotel for Dinner, the Pro Hart and Jack Abolsom galleries also the Silver City Mint and the Big Picture, a huge painting in the round depicting the area around Broken Hill, fantastic. We also went to the Miners memorial which overlooks the town.

Onto Wilcannia but we stayed 5 km further on at Warrawong, at a station, thank you Ruth, a great spot. To Cobar, census night, where we stayed at a free camp Newry Resevoir, thanks to Wicki Camps, a lovely spot. We had the census people come to us but Doris and I had done our duty as our families had sent us the necessary number to log in. They didn't believe we had done it but we assured her that we had receipt numbers....we did it at the weekend before, no hassles for us.

Doris was having battery trouble and was happy to stay and make her own way north.

Onto Bourke for a few nights with Doris catching us up there. We did the usual visitor stuff and moved onto Lightning Ridge to find Doris and the Schells and Ron already there.
